

1. Woodbury County hereby consents to and grants permission to the property owner, organization or authorized representative, to conduct the following described construction or activities within the right-of-way:	ne e o

 In consideration of Woodbury County granting said permission and consent, the property owner, organization authorized representative hereby promises and agrees to the following: 	201 11 201

- A. The applicant shall carry on the construction, repair and maintenance with serious regard to the safety of the traveling public and adjacent property owners.
- B. The property owner, organization or authorized representative, at his/her own expense, shall provide all safety measures and warning devices necessary to protect the traveling public such as but not limited to, signs, lights, and barricades during the day and at night if the roadway will be obstructed. Traffic protection shall be in accordance with Part VI of the current Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways. The Department will loan the required signs to the applicant who shall be responsible for placing the signs and covering or removing when not in use, removal after the work has been completed, and return of the Department owned signs to the Department maintenance facility from which obtained. The applicant shall be responsible for correctly using signs as needed while work is in progress. Flagging operations are the responsibility of the applicant.
- In placing any drainage structure, no natural drainage course will be altered or blocked.
- D. The finished project shall be left in a satisfactory condition subject to the approval of the County Engineer. The traveled portion of the roadway shall not be damaged or disturbed. The property owner, organization or authorized representative assumes all liability and agrees to reimburse Woodbury County for any damage to the roadway or ditch caused by placement of this structure. Permittee is to call County Engineer for upon completion for final inspection.
- E. The property owner, organization or authorized representative shall notify all appropriate telephone and utility companies in advance of any excavation and shall check for underground electric or telephone lines.

F. Woodbury County will not assume any of the cost of the construction of the said improvement or structure nor will Woodbury County assume any future costs for maintenance or replacement of said improvement or structure. If in the best interest of Woodbury County, the said improvement or structure may be removed by the County, or may be caused to be removed, without any obligation by Woodbury County to pay damages or cost of replacement.
G. Property owner, organization or authorized representative will reseed and mulch the disturbed areas. Property owner, organization or authorized representative will be responsible for seed, mulch, and labor unless otherwise provided in section L.
H. The property owner, organization, or authorized representative hereby agrees to hold Woodbury County and the Woodbury County Secondary Road Department, its employees and agents harmless against any and all claims for damages and personal injury arising out of work performed or actions taken by the applicant related to the construction or maintenance of the facility. The applicant further agrees to reimburse the County or the Department for any expenditures that the County or Department may have to make on said highway rights of way on account of said applicant's construction or maintenance activity or other activities or lack thereof. The applicant shall also save Woodbury County and the Woodbury County Secondary Road Department harmless of any damage or losses that may be sustained by the traveling public on account of such construction, repair or maintenance operations, or other activities.
1. FAILURE TO CONFORM TO OR TO ACQUIRE A PERMIT IS A VIOLATION OF SECTION 318.8, 2009 CODE OF IOWA. This permit is subject to any laws now in effect or any laws that may be hereafter enacted and all applicable rules and regulations of local, state and federal agencies. This permit is subject to all the rules and regulations of Woodbury County and the Woodbury County Secondary Road Department.
J. This permit is subject to revocation by the Department at any time and at no cost to the Department, when in the judgment of the Department it is necessary in the improvement or maintenance of the highway or for other reasonable cause
K. All proposed work covered by this permit shall be at the applicant's expense. The applicant shall reimburse the Woodbury County Secondary Road Department for any materials removed from the highway right of way described as follows:

Permit Provisions and Conditions of Issuance

1. The County and/or the County Board of Supervisors will not be charged with any responsibility for damages to the Applicant's property occasioned by any construction or maintenance operations on said county roads, including new or additional right-of-way acquired in connection therewith, subsequent to the building of the Applicant's facilities. The Board will endeavor to give the Applicant sufficient notice of any proposed construction or maintenance work, on either existing or newly acquired right-of-way that is likely to expose, cover up, or disturb any facilities belonging to the Applicant, in order that the Applicant may arrange to protect the facilities. 



WORDING FOR AGENDA ITEM: Siouxland District Health CIP Item

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: In order to strike a balance between a CIP item that was pushed back a fiscal year, the Board of Supervisors may recommend or endorse an approximate \$266,000 being kept by the Siouxland District Board of Health over the 25% reserve level. Doing so would allow them to stay on the timeline for needed services and mean that we do not have to bond for the project.

BACKGROUND: The District Board of Health has a project that initially called for \$300,000. The project grew to over \$470,000, and the District Board of Health Director Kevin Grieme believed that there was enough in their Health Fund to keep the CIP request to the Board at the level of \$300,000 in February.

I cautioned at both the District Board of Health and in reporting back during committee meetings that this project was tenuous for the following reasons: a pending MRHD application (which was denied in just the past two weeks) the Board of Supervisors was engaging a long-term Master Facility Plan study of all buildings between March and May; Supervisors had not toured and received an extensive scope of the project for this county facility (completed in September-October); the Board was going to go through a retooling of the CIP process with a better decision-making process. Kevin Grieme had reported that the Board of Health was included in the CIP because of a reversion of funds beyond 25%, and this had been initially approved in February 2015.

According to our Budget Analyst Dennis Butler, our current auditors have not changed the projection of \$266,000 being left over and above the 25% "reserve" of Siouxland District Health. My understanding from Kevin Grieme about a 2010 Iowa Code provision mandating a reversion of funds above 20% is that our Board of Health is the only one grandfathered in to not having to comply with the requirement under the Iowa Code. My understanding from Dennis Butler, our Budget Analyst, is that the county recommendation of 22% has been exceeded to (and agreed upon) at 25% simply for the 3% regarded as necessary for Capital Improvement.


Endorsing or recommending the Siouxland District Board of Health keep the reversion of funds above a certain threshold this year—and this year only—will keep them on their timeline and possibly even allow for lower total project cost implementation. It also respects their place in being influx and will not have a detrimental impact on their service reconfiguration.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: Recommendation or endorsement of \$266,000 is what the funding amount would be over 25%.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve motion

ACTION REQUIRED: I move that the Siouxland District Board of Health be given an endorsement to retain the funding amount over 25% reserve funding in order to move forward with their building CIP project.

WORDING FOR AGENDA ITEM: Property Tax Relief Resolution

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Based on the 2050 Vision, the Board was told that dedicated property tax relief could realize a range of 30-60% of total revenues from CF Industries. It is important for transparency to clarify what this means and for the Board to consider in the future what impact this will have on taxpayers.

BACKGROUND: In a presentation that our Budget Analyst, Dennis Butler, gave with a document showing "50% of TIF Revenues," we have told the public that half of the monies may be dedicated to property tax relief. The reality is that TIF Revenues can be used 100% toward development because we do not release the increment to the other taxing bodies. However, when we use the term "property tax relief," we can only provide that for the County as a taxing body, e.g. 39-43.43%. This means that the reality of the model skews the property tax relief number down.

Per the previous recommendations, I have had Dennis Butler, our Budget Analyst, run numbers at 30%, 40%, 50%, and 60% of property tax relief. I am recommending that the Board approve a resolution stating that 50% of CF Industries revenue be dedicated to property tax relief.

"The county has made it clear from day one they want to see property tax relief and identify key infrastructure projects," [Terry] Lutz said, "working with all cities in the county to see if they can leverage their new ... revenues to grow the pie even greater." (Sioux City Journal, October 15, 2014)

Candidates on both sides of the aisle ran on platforms dedicating CF Industries Revenues to property tax relief. The Board Chair prior to 2015 made clear that some portion was to be used for property tax relief.

While the Board has not formally adopted a percentage plan for dedicating tax increment financing, there is no need to set a minimum or maximum for TIF: the Iowa Code mandates without project obligations that taxes be released to the respective taxing bodies, e.g. Woodbury County, Sergeant Bluff School, WIT, the County Assessor, Ag Extension, and Liberty Township.

In previous discussions, Board members have had three counter-positions, which I do not take as opposition but as thoughtful: 1) What is the effect of such a resolution or stated percentage if it cannot bind a future board? 2) What if there is a large economic development opportunity that requires a greater investment of revenue that would further grow the tax base? 3) How much property tax relief will make a difference?

Response to #1: The point is well-taken that no current Board can bind a future Board, but the resolution is dedicated to set a goal, which is the point of all policy. No policy or guideline has the effect of law currently upon ourselves but is rather "a course or principle...adopted by a government."

Response to #2: Therefore, if some large economic development project presented itself before the Board, the public would weigh whether the Board's commitment was outweighed by the opportunity to further grow the tax base and could very well understand. If they did not agree, they would inevitably hold the Board accountable.

Response to #3: Taxes tend to go up as matter of course on the federal, state, and local level. Only government sees "incremental increases" and believes that it can better spend money than its own public can. This will also complement this last year's dedicated budget process of lowering tax askings for the first time in 15 years. In other words, it is a rarity to actually lower the levy rate *and* tax askings and this effort can be supplemented so that there are more in our local family budgets than in the county budget. The bonus is that as this is new growth, this will not come with a reduction in needed services.

The real key is the restraint and moderation by which the county dedicate first and foremost how much will be given back to taxpayers. Given that the Vision 2050 plan calls for 30-60% dedicated to property tax relief, it is reasonable to set 50% as the guideline. This will also clearly communicate to various entities, e.g. rural communities, who approach the Board with potential TIF projects to realistically gauge the available funding. For example, we recently had a request of \$8.2 million, which if this resolution was adopted, would mean that such a request would be 100% of all funding through FY 2025, which would not be reasonable for a single project request.

The attached and first document in the Board packet clearly details this. It should be noted that this is a stagnant model assuming no growth but one that is very valuable for the future in that it sets a baseline.

Woodbury County's Taxpayers First Resolution

Whereas CF Industries is the state of Iowa's largest capital investment to date of over \$2 billion and has acted as an invaluable partner for the growth of the County;

Whereas tax rates are high relative to surrounding lowa counties and to Nebraska and South Dakota for reasons outside of the County's control and this has a direct impact on competitiveness, further economic development, and where people choose to live and do business:

Whereas at the time of the 2050 Vision plan formulation, McClure Engineering listed Woodbury County's tax rates as the second highest among Iowa counties within 100 miles;

Whereas as the cost of living increases, taxpayers deserve to know their county government will live within its means so that while receiving county revenue of approximately \$56 million generated by CF Industries, meaningful property tax relief will be generated for families;

Whereas revenue from CF Industries is not generated until FY 2019 and the County already has four dedicated projects in the area using tax increment financing (CF Industries Entrance Rd; CF Industries On Site Road; AGP Road Port Neal Circle; and Dogwood Trail in Sergeant Bluff);

And whereas understanding this resolution cannot legally bind a future board, the current Board embraces this resolution as guiding policy and asks the electorate to hold public officials accountable for exercising the restraint that comes with limited government;

Now therefore be it resolved that the Board of Supervisors sets a guideline that in FY 2020 and beyond, 50% of all CF Industries revenue be dedicated to property tax relief and a statement be delivered annually to property taxpayers explaining publicly whether such money was dedicated to lowering the levy rate, offsetting mandated costs without increasing the levy, or dedicated to reserves.

Committee Introduction

Mark Monson, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, called the meeting to order. He set forth the purpose of the meeting, namely to discuss the future of funding for Local Option Sales Tax. Because of lowa Code and a voter referendum, these monies are allocated 80% to secondary roads and 20% to economic development.

Supervisor Jeremy Taylor volunteered to keep minutes of the meeting, and a name for the group was to be determined at a future date. (Toward the end of the meeting, it was agreed upon to be named the Rural Woodbury County Development Committee.)

Discussion of County Funds:

Chairman Monson described the creation of an RFP resolution for long-term planning crafted by Economic Development Director David Gleiser.

Supervisor Jeremy Taylor discussed great versus realistic expectations in understanding that the Board takes in about \$500,000 in Local Option Sales Tax and if the Board adopted a resolution prioritizing property tax relief, that not until 2019 does CF Industries revenue even reach \$49,000. One request recently before the Board was for \$8.2 million so that if apportioned among 14 communities, something in the \$30-35,000 range annually from LOST funds would be more realistic and it must be understood that the County's \$56 million from CF Industries gradually stair-steps in over 20 years so that the one \$8.2 million request would have taken all TIF revenue until 2025 for one community.

Comprehensive Plans

Chairman Mark Monson discussed the fact that 10 towns had comprehensive plans paid for by the county in 1970 but few have current ones. Economic Development Director David Gleiser spoke about options ranging from main street revitalization to the RFP for long-term planning. Any metric in his estimation should be measured by a three-fold goal: growth to the tax-base, future job growth and retention, and the ability to expand utilities and infrastructure.

Moville Mayor Jim Fisher and Sergeant Bluff Mayor Jon Winkel discussed the differences between a comprehensive plan required by Code and a true, functional plan having both recently developed one in each mayor's respective community. Mayor Fisher discussed private business needs ranging from various businesses within his community.

Supervisor Jeremy Taylor discussed the importance of making sure that a long-term plan preceded requests from the county to ensure that the project truly represented a consensus of the community. Because a long-term plan involves stakeholder meetings, this would keep the county from the untenable position of contributing to a project that only benefitted one or a few against the objections of a majority of the community (especially critical in discussions of water/sewer infrastructure).

Increased Dialogue from Mayors Representing All Parts of County

Sergeant Bluff Mayor Jon Winkel discussed the synergistic effect of having a "once in a lifetime opportunity" with AGP, CF, Seaboard and Triumph foods along with the added valuation in his community. In his opinion, it was critical to talk to each rural mayor (perhaps the mayors collectively). This could dovetail with increased discussion of E911 and emergency services, which is a topic that has brought rural mayors together in the past. This has happened in Climbing Hill, but they need to have real input.

Moville Mayor Jim Fisher discussed wanting to feel that they are an integral part of this and that the communication from the County Board of Supervisors needs to not only increase but be felt out in those areas. Whether it is meeting minutes or notes of discussions, there is a various spectrum of feeling somewhat involved to feeling left out. Perhaps a meeting that was more centralized than driving from Smithland to Sioux City would be meritorious of further discussion.

The group had consensus that every town and community is different and that the committee needs to listen as much if not more instead of planning to far out without garnering as much input as possible.

Record Editor Kent Baker likewise echoed what seemed widespread sentiment—that mayors are key to being listened to as representatives of their community. He also made the point how vital and integral clerks are to their communities. Perhaps they could be brought in on the discussion at some point, and Economic Development Director David Gleiser mentioned that he has a quarterly lunch with all clerks.

The Establishment of CDCs

Mayor Jon Winkel and Economic Development Director David Gleiser spoke about the power of establishing community development corporations. These exist in Correctionville, Cushing, Oto, Moville, and Sergeant Bluff. Both concurred that the groups are really only as good as those who are sitting at the table but have been instrumental in the Correctionville grocery store and the Cushing library.

Professional Services: Grant-Writing and Clerical Assistance

Chairman Mark Monson spoke of discussions with Western Iowa Tech's Steve Warnstadt regarding training for clerks and assistance in further education related to local government functions.

Sergeant Bluff Mayor Jon Winkel and Economic Development Director David Gleiser discussed several groups who could assist not only in planning but also in leveraging other dollars, e.g. "Advance Iowa," "The Institute of Decision-Making," and the "Strategic Marketing Initiative," some of which come from the University of Iowa and the University of Northern Iowa.

Possibilities of Local Option Sales Tax Uses

Discussed in the meeting were the potential of paying membership dues to SIMPCO for counties, \$100-120,000 for comprehensive plans paid for by the county, the development or startup of CDCs, grant-writing assistance to leverage more funds, an on-line marketing presence for communities, job recruitment of "cottage industry," training for clerks and staff, main street revitalization and nuisance abatement, and access to private capital through non-tax means (navigating SCDC loans and USDA grants through the RECs).

Future Meetings


Supervisor Jeremy Taylor and Economic Development Director David Gleiser will develop a survey to help poll the rural mayors at a gathering of the rural mayors with the Board of Supervisors. The goal would be to have the Board meet at that same time with the rural mayors and have a 30% presentation but 70% listening session. Perhaps the discussion of comprehensive plans, minutes of our meetings and initial discussions can take place; however, it seemed a key consensus was that the listening outweigh any presentation. This could include hearing "Needs" and "Wants" and listening to such wide-ranging topics as housing, family, and business needs.

November 15, a Sunday night, was suggested at a central location, e.g. The Fireside in Anthon. Having a meal and a discussion was thought to be a good idea, and we can explore if this is something that the county could fund in order to generate this important discussion.

The Taxpayers' Research Conference will have both Jim Johnson and Taylor Goodvin in future meetings, and Taylor Goodvin thought that this approach of garnering broad-based input seemed worthy of support.

The next meeting will be Tuesday, November 3, at 2:00 p.m. in Moville.

WORDING FOR AGENDA ITEM: Discussion and direction on Envision 2050 CIP projects and TIF use policy.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY. I would hope the BOS would discuss this agenda item prior to acting on the resolution that aims to release 50% of TIF revenues. The BOS has received an Envision 2050 plan from McClure Engineering at a cost of approximately \$54,500. The only portion of the proposed TIF policy that is being discussed and slated for action is the 50% release of TIF funds. Adopting the comprehensive TIF policy, such as outlined in the 2050 plan, would offer a balanced and comprehensive approach for future decision making in regards to intended use of the significant new tax revenues coming into the County. County Board is encouraged to weigh the impact and value of what is a relatively small reduction in property taxes if all or a portion of the LPURA revenues are allocated towards property tax relief versus the potential benefits from investing in new infrastructure projects that will help grow the tax base of the area and create new jobs.


BACKGROUND: A significant increase in TIF revenues is estimated to be a minimum of \$130 million through 2038. The BOS has the authority and option of investing all or a portion of these revenues in capital infrastructure projects or all or some of these revenues to be used for property tax relief. BOS has a comprehensive Envision 2050 plan that has not been adopted. Only one CIP project (Dogwood Trail) has had Board Action. There has been no public discussion of the remaining projects and there is risk that no project will occur in the next several years if the BOS adopts the proposed 50% release Resolution.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

RECOMMENDATION: Agenda item on 11/3/2015 to discuss and take action on a BOS retreat to review information from the Envision 2050 plan with goals of adopting a comprehensive TIF policy and identifying CIP projects.


